Brickleys Carry it Forward

Amy (Brickley) Manternach graduated in 1991 with a B.A. in Political Science and an International Business Certificate. After graduation, she worked at Prudential and rose to the role of Vice President, Total Retirement Solutions, and Site Lead at Prudential's Dubuque, Iowa office. For the past 9 years she has served as the Chief Operating Officer at the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque.



Six years after Amy, her sister **Ann Brickley** completed a Political Science B.A. at the University of Iowa in 1997 and earned a J.D. from DePaul University. After law school, Ann worked for the U.S. Customs Service in New York, then as an Assistant U.S. Attorney in the Eastern District of New York, where she prosecuted narcotics trafficking and money laundering. From 2005 until October 2021, Brickley was a federal prosecutor at the U.S. Department of Justice in Washington, D.C., prosecuting corruption, crimes involving the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, money laundering, and civil forfeiture lawsuits against misappropriated cultural property. Career highlights include securing bribery convictions against U.S. Army Officers for a bribery and money laundering scheme during Operation Iraqi Freedom ('08); negotiating guilty pleas with foreign public officials and U.S.-based bribe payors ('17-'21); negotiating a settlement agreement that included returning a ceremonial war shield to the Pueblo of Acoma; and negotiating a settlement agreement that resulted in repatriating an ancient sumerian clay tablet bearing portions of the Epic of Gilgamesh to the Republic of Iraq ('21). Brickley has been awarded the Army Achievement Medal for Civilian Service, the Assistant Attorney General's Award, and the Department of Treasury Award for "courage and bravery" on September 11, 2001. She is currently Senior Associate General Counsel at Nasdaq.

In the next generation, Amy's son, **Jared Manternach**, graduated from the University of Iowa in 2017 with a B.A. in Political Science and the University of Iowa College of Law in 2019 with his J.D. Jared currently serves as a prosecutor in the United States Navy JAG Corp in Washington, D.C. Amy's stepson, **Mitchell Manternach**, graduated from the University of Iowa with a B.A. in Political Science in 2006. Mitchell also obtained an MBA and has worked in several roles at John Deere since graduating. He currently serves as a global cotton aftermarket product manager. His daughter is projected to graduate from the University of Iowa with a Political Science degree in 2040.

FACULTY RESEARCH

Examining the Consequences of the Secure Communities Program

Rene Rocha is currently working with JJ Park, a PhD student in the Department of Sociology, to determine whether recent changes to immigration policy cause undocumented immigrants living in the US to leave. They are examining the consequences of the Secure Communities program, which allows Immigration and Customs Enforcement to partner with local law enforcement agencies to identify, hold, and remove undocumented immigrants. Proponents of the program believe that even a small increase in immigration enforcement can encourage many undocumented immigrants to leave, an idea known as "self-deportation." The logic is similar to that of issuing speeding tickets—only a few speeders are ever ticketed but the risk a getting a



ticket is a strong deterrent nonetheless. Opponents of the program believe immigration into the US is driven by powerful economic and social forces, and the ticket analogy just does not hold up: people usually don't speed out of desperation. Rene and JJ are investingating which of these arguments hold up when subjected to rigorous statistical analyses of government data and surveys of immigrants from Latin America.
